


a.k.a. False Cause:Claiming one event causedanother event because itoccurred before (A then B,therefore A caused B)

False Analogy: Using an analogy as evidence/proof to support your argument



One must use analogies with great care, keeping in mind that they may be fine illustrations but poor proof.



Appeal to Ignorance: An argument for something based on lack of evidence against it (There is no evidence for P, therefore not-P)
